easy to grow delicious food in your own backyard or at school. It's basically free, and growing vegetables your-




self saves lots of fuel because you're not having them shipped from somewhere far away. (The fresh veggies taste great too!)

Caring for God's Creation

- 1. **Psalm 24:1.** The earth is the Lord's.
- **2. Genesis 1:28.** God created the earth, but He has made us managers of His property. Good managers take care of their entrusted goods. (See also Matthew 25:14-30.)
- **3. Genesis 2:15.** Caring for the earth includes keeping it orderly and beautiful—not exploiting its resources through greedy waste.
- **4. 1 Corinthians 10:31.** Because God owns the earth (Psalm 95:5), caring for His creation is a way
- **5. Proverbs 12:10.** Even animals are to be cared for and not neglected or mistreated.

we can honor Him

- **6. Hebrews 2:6-8.** God has given the earth into our care not to trash or abuse it, but to bring out its full potential.
- **7. Genesis 3:17-19.** Sin caused our earth to be in its present dying and decaying state. (See also Romans 5:12.)

- **8. Revelation 11:18.** God will ultimately (reluctantly) destroy those who destroy the earth, and create a new heaven and a new earth. (See also Isaiah 51:6.)
- **9. Isaiah 11:9.** If nothing will hurt or destroy in the new earth, it is a good idea to learn how to build up, not destroy, on this earth!
- 10. Genesis 1:31. God originally made everything good and perfect. It is the work of redemption* to bring us back to the original Garden of Eden condition. God is pleased when we partner with Him right now to restore as far as possible our body, mind, and spirit to how He first made us. Stewardship of (caring for) all God's creation is one way we can worship God.

Ellen Looks Out for the Animals

Ellen White advocated vegetarianism not just to promote humanity's health, but also to prevent animal suffering:

"Animals are often transported long distances and subjected to great suffering in reaching a market. Taken from the green pastures, and traveling for weary miles over the hot, dusty roads, or crowded into filthy [trains or trucks], feverish and exhausted, often for many hours deprived of food and water, the poor creatures are driven to their death, that human beings may feast on the carcasses" (*The Ministry of Healing*, p. 314).

In the same book (p. 315), God's messenger penned these words:

"Animals see and hear and love and fear and suffer."

"Think of the cruelty to animals that meat eating involves, and its effect on those who inflict and those who behold it."

It turns out that being kind to animals is not such a new concept after all!



llen White was born in 1827 near Portland, Maine, U.S.A. Seventh-day Adventists believe that God called her to be a prophet and gave her messages through dreams and visions, as foretold in Bible passages such as Joel 2:28, 29 and Ephesians 4:11-13.

Ellen White's writings bring messages of hope that express the love of Jesus for every person. She proclaimed that the Ten Commandments are based on God's great love and that God will help His children keep His commandments as a response to that love. Ellen White dedicated her entire life to serving others.
